

### The Lord's My Shepherd (Psalm 23)

#### STUART TOWNEND

Psalm 23 is one of the most loved Christian hymns. It first appeared as an authorised part of formal praise in the Scottish Psalter of 1650 and remains in the hymn books of most Christian churches today. However, in 1996 contemporary hymn writer and musician Stuart Townend was inspired by the meaning of the words to create his own tune and modern text.

"I never set out to write a new musical version of this psalm – it seems very brove, or very arrogant, to think you can improve on the existing hymn version, which has been loved and sung by millions of people for so long! I was actually working on a different song at the time, which after several hours' hard work was not going well... I happened to flick to this psalm in my Bible while taking a break, a simple melody popped into my head, and the whole thing was written in ten minutes (something I wish as a writer would happen more often to me!).

The psalm is familiar to many as a psalm of comfort, in, for example, funeral services. But I also noticed that the psalm uses a lot of 'movement' imagery (walking, leading, following, etc) that speaks to me of an active response of faith to what the psalm is saying – we are to live each day believing goodness and mercy are following us, that there are still waters and green pastures to be found. That's why I included a response in the chorus of "I will trust..."

This arrangement for clarinet quartet or quintet includes Townend's original lyrics, tune, and chorus response. Verses 1 and 2 use a version of the original harmonies. However, Verse 3 opens with a new, darker, minor-key harmonisation which matches the words, "Although I walk through the darkest path", before returning to the brighter major key for the chorus. To play as a quartet, omit Clarinet 4. Each verse is arranged differently so that it provides sufficient musical interest as an instrumental recital piece, or for accompanying weddings and funerals. However, it is equally suited to worship and church settings; a lead vocal sheet with chord symbols is included. The tempo markings are the arranger's own, so can be adjusted to suit your musical interpretation. A flexible ensemble version of this arrangement is available for Worship; including transposed parts in Bb, F and Eb and in different clefs.
